Dear Mr. Ruben:

This summer I worked for the Transition Age Foster Youth (TAFY) Unit of Public Counsel's Children's Rights Project (CRP). The attorneys in this unit work with foster youth who are about to "age out" of the system. This population is at very high risk of homelessness after exiting the system and needs help transitioning successfully to independent adulthood. As a law clerk, I performed a wide variety of tasks. For two new clients, I assisted in their intake interviews and wrote case summaries, requested their records, and spotted legal issues while organizing their records. I also organized a college tour of Occidental College and UCLA. Other duties included drafting a memo comparing the duties and authorizations in Public Counsel's and the Superior Court's education attorney agreements. Finally, I wrote a memo recommending a school placement for a youth with special education needs who was moving to a new school district.

One especially exciting project involved assisting the youth in applying for summer jobs that were funded specifically for foster youth by the County. When my colaw clerk and I noticed that the youth were facing similar barriers in the process — primarily difficulty in obtaining the necessary documents, such as their birth certificates and proof of residency — we wrote a policy memo outlining these barriers and making policy recommendations. The County Board of Supervisors took these suggestions seriously and asked the administering organizations to change their policies based on our recommendations. I greatly appreciated the opportunity to see the work I did make a difference in individual lives as well as at a systemic level. Soon after enrolling our youth

in jobs programs, we started to see the impact on their lives. One boy, in particular, was so thrilled to have an "office job" that he showed up three hours early for the first day of orientation, just so that he would not be late and dropped from the program. When his school told him that he needed to turn in missing homework assignments before they would sign his work permit, he completed them immediately.

Reflecting back on the summer as a whole, I am so grateful I had the opportunity to work at Public Counsel this summer. I especially treasured the interaction I had with the youth and appreciated how my supervisors sought to involve me in many different parts of their work. My supervisors took me to an intake interview at a client's home, an Individualized Education Plan meeting at a school, Drug Court and Juvenile Hall, and Children's Court for dependency hearings. Moreover, Public Counsel in general was an amazing place to learn, since it offered so many opportunities to serve and to learn in different areas of public interest law: in addition to the required trainings for CRP, I participated in the Skid Row Tour, General Relief Advocacy Program Day, the Foreclosure Rescue Scam Training, and Adoption Day, and I attended talks on legal writing and trial advocacy as well. Most of all, I enjoyed the people at Public Counsel – interns, attorneys, and staff alike – all of whom I found to be incredibly intelligent, committed, and kind.

Thank you for supporting these types of summer experiences. Without the support of organizations like yours, law students might not be able to have these kinds of experiences, which enrich our sense of purpose and responsibility as lawyers.
